COURSE GOALS

The ENG 1030 course is designed to support and enhance your work in ENG 1060. Because 1060 has diverse goals and tasks – longer papers, more library research, well-structured arguments – many students can benefit from devoting an extra credit's worth of time to the coursework. The small-group 1030 meetings will provide time for us to clarify assignments, share drafts and explore ideas for research. If you use the time in 1030 well, you should do very well in ENG 1060 and learn some approaches to writing tasks that you can use in other courses.

ASSIGNMENTS

Generally, your assignment for each meeting of 1030 is to bring with you whatever you are currently working on in ENG 1060. The majority of our work in 1030 will be done <u>during</u> the class, not as homework; however, *occasionally* I'll ask you to read something from our research handbook (*The Little Brown Handbook*) or from an online source in order to support an activity I'd like us to work on as a small group. We'll spend the majority of our time, though, responding to drafts, using a variety of methods (descriptive responding, sayback, analytic responding, and others).

GRADING

Students must earn at least 75 points to pass the class and may earn up to seven points for each 1030 class meeting, using this scale:

- Present and highly engaged = seven points
- Present and engaged = six points
- Present and partially engaged = five points
- Present = four points
- Absent = zero points

The 1030 course requires a new level of engagement and active participation for success, which should be easier due to the small class size. The difference between being "engaged" (earning 6 points) and "highly engaged" (earning 7) is that a highly engaged student is working toward not only his/her success, but also classmates'.

You may make up a maximum of two absences by attending other 1030 sessions offered by your instructor or by visiting the University Writing Center for personal consultations. Students may receive only two points for each absence they make up. Students who visit the University Writing Center to make up an absence should request a signed form from their writing center tutor and turn it in to me.
